Some students face early/forced marriage threats and find the school a safe haven for them. During this time, the girls are provided more freedom with the facilities to encourage them enjoy the break without missing home. They all do some light work, some do part-time work and earn money, which helps them purchase a few personal items. After morning activities like harvesting groundnuts, students had ample time for playing basketball, watching movies, and musical entertainment. In the evenings, the students accompanied by staff had an hour evening walks to the villages. It was a great experience for all as they got familiar with the neighbouring environment. Of great importance was the one-week art therapy facilitated by Fr. Joe and students benefitted from this trauma healing session.

Welcoming primary 8 girls

While at home, the young school girls are burdened with many home chores and lack of electricity in rural areas denies them the opportunity to study at night. In Loreto, our girls face similar challenges and they shared their predicaments with their teacher and mentor, Margaret Athiei, a Loreto graduate. The school management did not hesitate to reach out to these girls and to meet their needs and demands to enjoy a more conducive learning environment. Twelve girls; 11 from Loreto P8 and one from P6(facing marriage threat) were absorbed as boarders for better study time as they prepare for the national exam. To show their support to the program, their parents/guardians signed commitment forms pledging to support their girls and allow them join boarding life. In the beginning of term three of the academic year 2019, the 12 girls from Loreto primary reported to Loreto secondary. The students were happy to receive the girls who were placed in the various Loreto school families for them to feel at home and fit in the Loreto-family culture.
